About Center Programs

Kent ISD Center Programs provide specialized services to meet the needs of students with an Individual Education Program (IEP) who have complex needs. There are nine Center Programs for students from birth through age 26, who reside within the boundaries of Kent ISD's districts. Placement in programs is determined through the IEP process when the IEP team determines highly specialized services are needed to meet a student's needs.

Kent ISD assumed operation of Center Programs in 2019. Total Communication joined Center Programs in fall of 2020, and Region 1 Transition Services (R1TS) joined in 2022 combining with our existing transition program and becoming Empower U.

Vision: Kent ISD Center Programs will empower and equip students with the strategies and skills needed to maximize their participation and independence and to ensure equitable access in school, community, career, and life.

About the Impact Report

This report for the 2021-22 school year contains data from our programs that serve students from kindergarten through age 26. Early childhood programs administered by Center Programs are not included in this report. Some metrics are consistent across programs, such as our staff and family survey data. The specialized nature of each program and the range of individual student needs means that metrics and outcomes for student learning vary by program.

Each program reports the following data where available:

- Exit outcomes: Exit outcomes vary by program based on age and student need but may include re-entering school in their home district, pursuing employment, earning a diploma or connecting with a community agency.
- Core Skills Achievement: Each program focuses on several core skills to prepare learners for their next step. Achievement may be reported by the proportion of students who are able to demonstrate core skills or have shown improvement over the school year. Several programs are developing metrics for the 2022-23 school year and do not yet have data to report.
- Family and Staff Survey Data: Items from 2022's staff and family surveys regarding perceived quality of student learning, community agency partnerships and school safety provide a snapshot of how some of our key stakeholders see our strengths and areas for improvement.

Students learn the speech, listening and literacy skills to communicate independently, whether at home, in school or in social settings. Audiological services are also provided so that students have the resources or devices they need to best access sound, setting them up for greater success.






The Total Communication Program serves students from birth through grade 12 who are deaf or hard of hearing (DHH). Staff here tailor their teaching to the unique abilities and needs of each student. To set students up for academic success, they may practice skills including American Sign Language (ASL), spoken English and other forms of nonverbal communication.

MISSION



The Total Communication Program provides access and instruction in American Sign Language, spoken English, or a combination of both to ensure that every deaf and hard of hearing student develops a full language and can gain meaningful education.





Collectively called "Lincoln Pines," Lincoln School, Lincoln Developmental Center and Pine Grove Learning Center serve students with severe multiple impairments, cognitive impairments and autism spectrum disorder in kindergarten through age 26. Students from the southwestern area of Kent ISD attend Pine Grove, and those in the north, central and east attend Lincoln Campus. In each school, students receive support and services to meet their individual needs in academics, mobility and more.

MISSION



We educate students with complex needs by providing specialized instruction specific to the communication, academic, adaptive behavior, mobility, and adult living skills required to develop independence.



"Since starting here, Lucas has continued to get stronger. He is moving a lot more with a lot less support. The biggest thing is his communication. We were seeing some behaviors when he wasn't able to express himself. When we were first starting it was a lot of yes or no questions. Now, he says, 'I love you.' He wishes people happy birthday. Him being more independent, learning a lot of those functional skills and also the communication has been huge, not just for Lucas, but for our family."




